## 30 Iowa High Schools Win \$1,000 in Financial Literacy Challenge Hundreds of Students Increase Their Understanding of College Financing by

Hundreds of Students Increase Their Understanding of College Financing by Participating in Iowa Financial Know-How Challenge

WEST DES MOINES, IOWA (*April 9, 2013*) — Thirty Iowa high schools were the winners of \$1,000 and hundreds of students took steps to increase their understanding of student Ioan debt as a result of the 2013 Iowa Financial Know-How Challenge.

lowa Student Loan<sup>®</sup>, in partnership with the Iowa Department of Education, the Iowa Jump\$tart Coalition, Junior Achievement of Central Iowa and the Iowa College Access Network, offered the cash awards to Iowa high schools that participated in the Challenge. A major component of the Challenge entailed high school teachers incorporating the online financial literacy tutorial Student Loan Game Plan<sup>™</sup> into their classroom instruction. With Student Loan Game Plan, high school students learned how they could plan ahead and borrow less for college by making informed financial decisions. In addition, educators received information about how they could incorporate other programs and materials offered by the Challenge's sponsoring organizations to help satisfy financial literacy requirements for the Iowa Core 21st Century Skills.

"I'm really happy that our school participated in this year's Challenge," said Patti Edler, guidance counselor at West Marshall High School in State Center. "Student Loan Game Plan provided my students with eye-opening and pertinent information about paying for college. I went through it with all my seniors."

The Iowa Financial Know-How Challenge is a homegrown program that was created after the federally sponsored National Financial Capability Challenge was discontinued last fall. In 2012, Iowa Student Loan and its partners successfully promoted the national financial Page 1 of 3

literacy challenge among lowa high schools using the same cash drawing incentive. Following their efforts and those of others across the state, participation among lowa high schools in the national program increased by more than 50 percent. However, lowa's participation success did not reflect national high school participation, which declined by nearly 10 percent.

"For the past two years, our department has helped to support financial literacy contests for students to participate in. It has been great to observe so many enthusiastic lowa high school students engage in these creative financial challenges," said Mike Cormack, policy liaison for the lowa Department of Education.

"Financial literacy is an important lifelong skill set for students to understand, and this new program promotes the topic in a positive manner. Iowa students are the winners in this public-private partnership," Cormack added.

This year between February 18 and March 29, a total of 44 Iowa high schools enrolled in the Iowa Financial Know-How Challenge and incorporated Student Loan Game Plan into their curriculum. Educators and administrators used Student Loan Game Plan in a variety of ways — from having individual students go through the tutorial to working through the module as a classroom exercise.

"We're pleased that we had almost 1,200 lowa high school students go through Student Loan Game Plan individually," said Steve McCullough, president and CEO of Iowa Student Loan. "Because many teachers also shared the tutorial with groups of students, we're confident that hundreds more were educated on actions they can take now to reduce the amount they need to borrow for college."

Winners of the cash drawing were randomly selected earlier this month from Iowa high schools that completed the Challenge. The following winners were chosen from the 44 schools meeting those qualifications.
